


The Eagles, now one of pop music's true supergroups, exploded in 1975 with the kind of popularity limited to a very few. Their album "One Of These Nights" was one of the top sellers of any record released last year. Tight, fresh, melodic, the Eagles make music that has been described as mellow country revved up with a rock beat. They were first brought to Asylum's attention by one of its top artists, Jackson Browne, after Glenn Frey had co-written "Take It Easy" with Browne. Frey was joined by Don Henley, Bernie Leadon, Don Felder and Randy Meisner to form the Eagles. "Take It Easy" was recorded as their first single and the song was an immediate smash. That was in 1971; the Eagles—with an incredible series of singles and five best-selling albums behind them—have been with Asylum ever since. From the beginning, their smooth sound attracted a broad audience. On last year's 59-city tour, some 860,000 people paid over \$5 million to hear them in concert. Their first 1976 release, "Eagles—Their Greatest Hits, 1971-1975" has already shipped over one million albums.

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
